GRADING

Scholastic grades are recorded in letters. The grade scale follows:

A = 90-100 ~ Exceptional accomplishment B = 80-89 ~ High accomplishment C = 70-79 ~ Average accomplishment D = 60-69 ~ Low accomplishment F = 0.59 ~ Failing I = Incomplete

Student grades are averaged in three categories: daily grades, formative assessments, and summative assessments. The course syllabus will indicate the weight of each of these categories. 
